





Our Heritage

Old Boys

Waverley College Old Boys have excelled across all fields - from business, politics and literature, to medicine, engineering and law. Some, like the Honourable Sir Peter Cosgrove AK CVO MC (Retd), have forged distinguished careers serving their country after commencing their training with the Waverley College Cadet Unit (WCCU).

Others have achieved distinction in the arts including internationally-acclaimed opera singer Daniel Sumegi; best selling author John Flanagan and rock 'n' roll legend Johnny O'Keefe.

Graduates of the College have also contributed significantly to the not-for-profit sector. Patrick McClure has held the position of CEO at both Mission Australia and The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul (NSW/ACT). Peter Collins AM was the Leader of the Opposition and has chaired over eight national not-for-profits and public service departments. A/Prof Brett Courtenay OAM is currently President of the Board of Trustees at St. Vincent's Clinic and currently holds the rank of Colonel and is the Senior Medical Officer and Chair of Clinical Governance for the 2nd Division of the Army.

Many have also achieved high-profile sporting success, such as 1930s rugby legends Cyril Towers and Dave Brown; triple international sportsman and politician Michael Cleary AO; former Wallaby Morgan Turinui and current AFL Swans players Nick Blakey and Isaac Heeney.

Junior Campus

The Junior School

In Years 5 and 6 we aim to make teaching and learning engaging and inspiring at a time when boys need extra care and new challenges to assist their development. Learning in this environment will also prepare your son for a seamless transition to Year 7.

The Junior School caters for approximately 300 students and is located on a separate campus in Henrietta Street, which is a five-minute walk from the Senior School.

Your son will primarily be taught by his base teacher at the Junior School, but his learning experiences will engage him in a varied curriculum that includes subjects taught by specialist teachers in STEM, Innovation & Literacy, PDHPE, Performing Arts, Spanish, Art, Science and TAS.

'One School' Approach

Our 'one school' approach means that your son will follow the same Teaching & Learning Framework and Wellbeing Framework from Years 5 to 12. Building connection is really important at Waverley College, and your son will be paired with a senior student mentor as part of our Big Brother Little Brother Program.

Flexible Learning Spaces

At the heart of the Junior School is our Learning Hub - a flexible, student-directed space that encourages collaboration. The Learning Hub is equipped with reconfigurable furniture, which means that our students can arrange the area to suit a whole host of activities. It's also home to our Waverley Masterclass: Lunchtime Talks initiative, where we invite inspirational guest speakers in to share their stories with students.

Junior students benefit from access to Senior School facilities, including the swimming pool and Performing Arts Centre (PAC).

Senior Campus

The Senior School

Our Senior School caters for approximately 1,200 students from Years 7 to 12. The main campus combines over a century of history with outstanding facilities, providing our students with innovative learning spaces and best-practice teaching resources.

Our Curriculum

The College curriculum uses visible learning strategies and evidence-based practices to meet NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) requirements. Our teachers are lifelong learners and we are committed to a culture that mentors and supports them to be the best teachers and carers they can be.

Teaching & Learning Framework

Our Teaching & Learning Framework is based on three core principles: visible learning, lifelong learning and dynamic learning. Our goal is student agency and collective teacher efficacy.

Collective teacher efficacy is the collective belief of all staff in their ability to positively affect students. A school staff that believes it can collectively accomplish great things is vital for the health of a school and improving student learning outcomes.

Student agency means the student is actively involved in the learning process. They take ownership of their learning through meaningful and relevant activities that reflect their interests. Students are empowered to self-regulate, self-initiate and self-reflect with appropriate guidance from all their teachers.

We commit to this success structure by encouraging our students to set goals, develop a growth mindset, build resilience and pursue curiosity. To deliver on this promise, we offer students a wealth of opportunities in their studies - from individual and collaborative learning, and critical and creative thinking, to cross-curricular approaches. We set clear learning intentions and success criteria for formative assessment, and provide detailed and constructive feedback while allowing students time for self-reflection.

Academic Enrichment

Our Academic Enrichment Program supports high-ability students to thrive by providing differentiated experiences both internally and externally.

The agile learning experiences that we offer enhance student development by transferring information from the classroom into more challenging real-world contexts. This approach ensures that your son remains stimulated and engaged in core subject content while deepening his critical thinking and understanding of broader issues.

Inter-School & State Competitions

We encourage participation in a number of inter-school and state contests - from debating and ICAS competitions, to Mathematics Olympiads and The Ethics Olympiad.

National Competitions

The College is also involved in national contests including the Da Vinci Decathlon, Tournament of Minds (TOM), Australian and New Zealand Brain Bee challenges, Bebras Challenge, The National High School Mooting Competition and STEM competitions.

Old Boy Mentor Program

As part of our commitment to enhancing student academic potential, we connect students with experienced professionals who can engage and inspire their deep love of learning. Students go beyond what they learn in the classroom to explore their passions, build confidence and encourage inquiry.

Excursions

Enrichment excursions include NSW State Library visits and TEDx Talks. We also attend the Waverley Masterclass Series, which provide students with an opportunity to engage with high-profile experts in a variety of fields.

Additional Individual & Group Activities

We engage students in a range of additional individual and group enrichment activities - from individual passion projects to Thinker's Keys and communities of inquiry.

Learning Support

The College provides a diverse range of Learning Support services to empower students with additional needs to reach their potential. Support starts when your son commences his journey with us in Year 5 and continues until he graduates in Year 12.

Our specialist Learning Support team works in partnership with the Academic Enrichment Coordinator, Literacy Coordinator, school psychologists and wellbeing teams to help students develop positive attitudes towards learning and build supportive relationships within the College community. In addition to teacher aides, we allocate one Learning Support teacher to each year group and develop a specialised learning plan for every student with a disability or learning difficulty.

The College's Learning Support programs include in-class support and intervention classes, individual and group withdrawals, cross-age tutoring, counselling and exam disability provisions.

But it isn't just about your son's time at Waverley. We'll also prepare him for life after Waverley, by helping him to build the confidence to make informed decisions about his future. In Stages 5 and 6, we offer a Work Education elective and Study Skills Program that focuses on life skills, employment and further education, covering everything from money management and interpersonal skills, to resume writing, job interviews and work experience opportunities.

Wellbeing

We have developed an evidence-based wellbeing framework which is mapped across all stages of learning from Years 5 to 12. The framework helps students to flourish across our five wellbeing dimensions: cognitive, social, emotional, physical and spiritual.

We are committed to developing a positive classroom environment that supports the learning of all students. It is important that each student feels that they are known, valued and cared for as an individual. We know that students who feel connected to each other, their families and the wider community, find greater purpose and meaning in their lives, and importantly, have the best outcomes at school.

At Waverley we believe in equality, appreciate diversity, and value inclusion. Equity in education means providing all students, regardless of their background, abilities and preferences, with the teaching and learning resources they need to be successful.

Wellbeing Mentors & Groups

Throughout their Waverley journey students belong to one of our eight Houses. Each House is led by a Head of House, who is based in our Wellbeing Centre. Our Heads of House nurture House spirit and help to create a safe and supportive environment.

Every teacher at the College is a wellbeing mentor with an allocated wellbeing group. These groups meet every morning with the aim of developing a strong bond with their mentor and group across year levels. In this time, we also unpack issues affecting adolescents including character development, equality, respectful relationships, men's health, discrimination, and local and global issues. This program is also supported by expert guest speakers.

On-Campus Health & Wellbeing Specialists

We have three registered psychologists based on campus to support students and their families, as well as a College nurse who manages our Health Centre. All staff at the College, both teaching and non-teaching, have completed Mental Health First Aid Training through Mental Health First Aid Australia. All staff have been upskilled and equipped with the knowledge and skills to recognise mental health problems, and to confidently provide the appropriate support to someone who may be developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis. Waverley is currently one of only two schools in NSW and the first Catholic school in NSW to achieve a Gold level recognition certification.

Wellbeing Activities & Events

Our students engage in a range of wellbeing activities and incursions throughout the academic year. This includes our Big Brother Little Brother Program, where students from the Junior School are mentored by students from the Senior School, as well as events such as R U OK? Day, International Women's Day, White Ribbon Day, Men's Health Week and the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence, to name a few.





Creative and Performing Arts

Students from St Clare's and Waverley have the opportunity to come together to be involved in large-scale musical productions performed in the NIDA Parade Theatre. Outdoor Learning Programs

Waverley College Cadet Unit

Cadets is a youth development program that empowers students to become active and responsible citizens and leaders. The Waverley College Cadet program is designed to build tenacity, resilience and initiative, along with leadership and management skills. Through collaboration and teamwork, our cadets learn the value of leading, serving and working with others.

The Unit recently formed a new partnership with St Catherine's School, adding a co-educational element to the program. This exciting development encourages cadets from both schools to develop the kinds of professional relationships that they will encounter in their adult lives and in the wider community.

Cadets attend weekly parades and training, in addition to important ceremonial occasions such as the annual ANZAC Commemoration Parade and the Year 12 Passing Out Parade. Training culminates in the Annual Field Exercise (AFX), a week-long camp that gives our cadets the opportunity to put their newly-honed skills into practice. As a CAS school, our cadets also compete against other Cadet units in the annual CAS Drill and Military Skills competitions.

The Waverley College Cadet Unit (WCCU) has a long and proud history dating back to 1911. All students are required to join the Unit in Semester 2 of Year 8 and complete three terms of training. From Semester 2 of Year 9 onwards, participation in Cadets is voluntary. Many of our students choose to continue, attracted by the program's emphasis on leadership development as they progress through the ranks, from Corporal to Cadet Under Officer (CUO).

Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme

The Duke of Edinburgh Award provides students with opportunities to explore their potential as they commit to regular participation in skill development, physical activity and service. The three-certificate system of bronze, silver and gold encourages students to be proactive in taking on challenges, setting goals, and being active in our local community. The Award is popular with students who can individualise their program by choosing activities which ignite their interest.

Outdoor Education Camps

In Years 5 to 10, all students attend several annual outdoor education camps. Camps provide valuable opportunities for your son to develop new skills, form friendships and work as part of a team while engaging in a range of fun activities that enhance his overall development.

Camps in Years 5 and 7 provide students with unique activities to bond and connect with their peers. Year 9 students learn resilience by rising to challenges at the AFX Cadet Camp. And in Years 8 and 10, students engage in activities to build resilience and extend themselves beyond their comfort zone. These camps deliver rich opportunities for students to grow in tenacity, responsibility and character in an outdoor environment.





Identity & Student Formation

Justice & Solidarity

Justice & Solidarity is an EREA Touchstone and giving back is a fundamental part of College life. As such, it is something that we want every student to experience.

Students in all years are encouraged to participate in outreach activities and develop a lifelong commitment to making a difference in local, national and global contexts. The College participates in a number of important causes throughout the academic year, with each House supporting a different charity and the whole school community fundraising for events including R U OK? Day, World's Greatest Shave for Leukaemia Foundation, Beanies for Brain Cancer, Running for Premature Babies and Indigenous Literacy Foundation.

Servant Leadership

Servant leadership is at the heart of student formation. The College encourages students to pursue leadership opportunities like the Student Representative Council (SRC), which consists of College Captains, House Captains, Prefects and House representatives from Years 7 to 11.

Our spiritual leadership program, The Edmund Rice Waterford Leadership Academy is open to students in Years 11 and 12, and focuses on character and faith development. Guest speakers address a variety of leadership topics, with particular emphasis on servant leadership. Our aim is to create young men of faith and integrity who care for others and seek to make a positive difference in their world.

Service

Service - Our Faith in Action

There is a special emphasis on service to the community at Waverley. Students can start making a difference to their community at a local, national and international level by participating in our dedicated community service program that offers invaluable volunteering and experiential learning opportunities.

Our program partners:

- ▶ Matthew Talbot Hostel provides accommodation, health, counselling and employment assistance to men who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. Students help in the kiosk in Woolloomooloo.
- ▶ Wayside Chapel provides day services for the homeless of Sydney which includes showers, meals and professional assistance for addiction, mental health and employment. They provide an awareness excursion for students, highlighting the difficulties facing homeless people in Australia.
- ▶ Wairoa School provides Special Provisions education to students from K to 12 with varying levels of ability. Our students spend a few hours each week as teachers assistants, reading, listening, and playing with the students from Wairoa.
- ▶ Redfern Jarjum College provides education for urban Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students who need a small school context to thrive. Our students attend Jarjum to help in the classroom or afternoon activities program.
- ▶ Holdsworth Community provides services for adults with a disability. Our students attend a weekly bowling activity engaging in conversation and having fun with the community. We also partner with St Clare's College to run the annual Holdsworth Ball.
- ▶ Windgap Foundation provides services for adults with a disability. Similar to Holdsworth, our students attend weekly activities and host an annual ball.
- ▶ Local aged care facilities where students attend regularly to engage in conversation, call the bingo or partake in a variety of activities run by the home.

Immersion & Deep Learning

We recognise more than 60,000 years of continual connection by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples as a key part of the nation's history, present and future. Through education, we are committed to ensuring that all students learn about the diversity of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures.

The College's Red Earth immersions take place in Arnhem Land, Cape York and Cape Tribulation where students explore our First Nations Peoples history, culture, engage in reconciliation, respect and connection to Country.

Our senior students are provided with opportunities to explore the rich social, cultural, religious and linguistic diversity of other global communities and embrace opportunities to communicate and share knowledge and experiences.

Our international immersions take us to Kenya and Timor-Leste and allow for the development of life-long friendships to be forged with people from different backgrounds. Students volunteer and engage with resource-poor local communities that are working towards sustainability and an improved standard of living which helps students look at life through a new lens.

Immersion leaders emphasise the importance of teaching our young men to give back with their hearts and hands because we believe that the development of authentic relationships based on respect, listening, and physically helping are just as valuable and significant as financial help.

At Waverley, we are future-focused. The College offers a wide range of careers support to ensure that every student is prepared for life beyond school. One-to-One Consultations and Career Profiling

Throughout the academic year, senior students have the option to attend personalised one-to-one consultations with our Senior Studies and Careers Coordinator. We can provide advice and guidance on subject selection, casual jobs, apprenticeships, university, TAFE and other post-school options.

In Year 10, students undertake a comprehensive careers assessment, which gives an accurate indication of HSC subject selection and suitable post-school study, training and employment pathways. Year 12 students are interviewed by the Senior Studies and Careers Coordinator in Terms 1, 2 and 3 of their final year, so we can match their interests, aspirations and abilities with a clear post-school plan.

Your son will benefit from access to a variety of careers-focused resources during his time with us. The College's dedicated careers website contains the latest information and resources for students and parents, including study skills and tips.

We'll also keep you up to date with post-school opportunities in our weekly careers newsletters. Years 10 to 12 are also given access to the Career Planet app and Job Jump website, which allow students to explore their options in more detail.
