



BUILDING SOLID ACADEMIC FOUNDATIONS

Moving from primary to secondary school is a big change, that whilst exciting, can also be challenging for many students. The Transition Program that runs throughout Year 7 supports our new students to transition to our school as smoothly as possible.

YEAR 8

A broad-based common curriculum continues with students consolidating knowledge and skills in preparation for the increased flexibility of Years 9 and 10.

YEAR 9

In Year 9, your son will identify his strengths and interests, is encouraged to develop areas of interest or try new subjects.

YEAR 10

By Year 10, your son will have developed preferred areas for their learning. Students can tailor a program suited to their interests, enjoyment and career aspirations. The curriculum at Simonds allows students to complete their VCE program over Years 10, 11 and 12.

YEAR 11 & 12

The emphasis in Years 11 and 12 are on the pursuit of academic excellence as they study for the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE), the VCE Vocational Major (VM) or Vocational Education and Training (VET) studies.

The VM is a vocational and applied learning program within the VCE.

VET studies are for students who prefer a hands-on approach and aim for an apprenticeship, work or trade training pathway.

The Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) provides diverse pathways to further study or training at university or TAFE and to employment.

READING PROGRAM

REP stands for "Reading Equals Power"- It's an appropriate title given the link between wider reading and educational outcomes. REP involves three 30 minute sessions per week, where Year 7-10 students read novels of their choice within their reading range.


Achievements in REP are celebrated through awards for "most improved", "most books read" and "most quiz points scored". There is also healthy competition between homegroups to see who can score the most points.

Research on the importance of wider reading is very clear – it develops crucial cognitive skills, expands vocabulary and develops general knowledge. It really does give students power in the classroom and power in life.

Learning Diversity Our teachers recognise the wide spectrum of learning profiles within each class. Students with diverse learning needs are supported in the classroom by Learning Support Officers and through Individual Learning Plans that include customised learning goals and modified curriculum and assessments.

SPARK stands for "Simonds Program for Accelerated Reading and Knowledge".

SPARK is a separate subject with a focus on developing the reading skills of students who need extra support in this area. SPARK classes operate in place of languages.



We have been very fortunate to establish an amazing partnership with Science Gallery Melbourne. Simonds and university staff work together to develop units of work and our boys are based at the STEM Centre for Excellence for part of the day on Tuesdays; Year 7s learn about coding, use microbits to design games and digital pets, developing skills in scientific methodology, critical thinking and problem solving.

HOUSE COMPETITION Each student is placed in one of four Houses including when he commences at the College.

Throughout the year the four Houses compete in various activities for the Michael Carmody Cup. These competitions enable students to develop team spirit and build camaraderie across year levels in sporting, academic, social and cultural pursuits.

The School Houses are named after the following Archbishops:



POLDING

John Bede Polding arrived in Australia on 13 September 1835. He was appointed Vicar Apostolic with jurisdiction over what is now the Commonwealth of Australia.



MANNIX

Archbishop Daniel Mannix was the Archbishop of Melbourne for 45 years and made his name with the Conscription issue during World War One. Twice he confronted the Prime Minister, William Hughes, on this matter, and with the help of the troops on the Western Front in Europe, defeated the Conscription Bill.



KNOX

Robert James Knox was appointed as the Archbishop of Melbourne, serving between 1967 and 1974. He saw education as pivotal and proposed one central theological college, rather than separate seminaries for diocesan priests and those of religious institutes.



GOOLD

Bishop James Goold helped to restore order and calm on the gold fields of Victoria and saw the need for school buildings within the Melbourne Area.

TRAMS


- **57 West Maribyrnong City** runs along Victoria Street and stops at the main entrance to the campus, students can alight at the Chetwynd Street stop
- 55 West Coburg Domain Interchange, St Kilda Road runs along nearby Peel Street. Students can alight at the Victoria Street stop
- 19 North Coburg City travels on nearby Elizabeth Street, students can alight at the Queen Victoria Market stop
- 59 Airport West City travels on nearby Elizabeth Street, students can alight at the Queen Victoria stop

BUSES

- 402 Footscray East Melbourne runs along Arden Street
- 216 Caroline Springs Sunshine Park runs along nearby Spencer Street
- 219 Sunshine South Gardenvale runs along nearby Spencer Street 220 Sunshine -Gardenvale runs along Dudley Street

TRAINS

- Flagstaff Station is nearby, a short 800m walk down William Street
- North Melbourne Station, a 5 minute walk via Hawke Street
- Melbourne Central Station, an 8 minute 57 tram ride away, or a brisk 15 minute walk.


