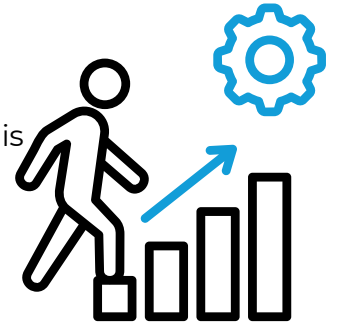
We thank You for the students, staff, families, and the wider community of our college. May You bring growth and blessing for the harvest ahead.

Staff Collaborative Professional Growth Process (CPG)

At St. Paul's College we are committed to the belief that every member of our community is capable of growth and continual improvement. In support of this belief, all academic staff engage in a structured professional learning journey known as the **Collaborative Professional Growth Process (CPG)**.



Through this process, each staff member partners with a collegial supporter who works collaboratively with them to enhance their professional practice. Together, they identify existing strengths, determine areas for further development, and engage in purposeful dialogue and reflection. This partnership is grounded in a shared commitment to professional inquiry, constructive feedback, and evidence-informed practice, including classroom observation.

Aligned with the **AITSL Performance and Development Framework**, the CPG recognises that effective feedback also stems from teachers observing and reflecting on their own practice. For this reason, the process includes the recording of selected segments of lessons to support professional reflection and targeted feedback. These recordings are focused solely on the teacher's practice; no student images will be used, published, or distributed. Any incidental capture of students is managed confidentially and in accordance with the College's Privacy Policy.

All recordings remain the property of the teacher being filmed and are used exclusively for their professional reflection and growth.

Year 11 & 12 Parent, Student, Teacher Conferences

The Parent, Student, Teacher Conferences for students in Years 11 and 12 are now open for bookings. **The conferences will be held Tuesday 2 June from 4.00pm – 7.00pm.**



All Parent, Student, Teacher conferences will be conducted online using TEAMS. The bookings will close at 6.00pm on Monday 1 June.

Parents book interview times as normal via Parent Lounge and on the day of the interview the class teacher will send an invite and admit parents at the scheduled time.

Interviews are booked at 8 minute increments, however, teachers have been instructed to complete interviews within 7 minutes to allow parents to connect to their next interview and allow themselves time to open the interview to the next waiting parent.

You are encouraged to book interviews with all teachers of your child. This is a good opportunity to discuss your child's strengths and areas that they can develop and improve. This can be valuable and useful information for Year 11 students as they near the middle of their Preliminary course or for Year 12 students as they get closer to completing their school-based course work and move forward in preparation for their HSC trials and NESA based examinations.

Boarding Buzz

National Boarding Week 2026

National Boarding Week was held in Week 4 and is a timely reminder that boarding is built on far more than routines, timetables and meals; it is built on relationships, trust and the daily commitment of people who care deeply about young people's growth. In reflecting on this week, we are reminded that the strongest boarding communities are those where students feel known, supported and valued, and where staff, families and the wider community work together with a shared purpose.

At St Paul's, that spirit is clearly visible in the way the week has been shaped around both celebration and service. From Monday's Boarders Day with NBW cupcakes, small plates shared with staff, movie time and treats in the houses, to the many planned activities across the week, there is a genuine effort to make students feel connected and celebrated.

One of the most meaningful aspects of the week is the focus on giving back. The card-making initiative for Ronald McDonald House, linked with the Boarders Birthday Cakes project through the Australian Boarding Schools Association and It's The Little Things Foundation, shows students that kindness can be practical and powerful. By writing heartfelt cards for families whose birthdays may be spent in hospital or at Ronald McDonald House, boarders were invited to take part in a thoughtful act that restores dignity, joy and normality during a difficult time. Although geography meant St Paul's supported the initiative through cards rather than attending in person, the intention remained the same: to join with boarding communities across the state in something bigger than any one house or school, and to remind students that they belong to a wider network of care and purpose.

The week also highlights the importance of recognising staff. Wednesday's community dinner, presentation and celebration of boarding staff was a fitting acknowledgement of the people who make boarding possible every day. Our boarding families entrust their children to the boarding team, and that responsibility is taken seriously and with gratitude. The message is clear that staff not only provide supervision and structure, but also create memories that last a lifetime, and that their commitment gives families confidence and students stability.

Just as important are the moments of fun that build house spirit and friendship. The Amazing Race, TikTok Dance Challenge, Giant Selfie Challenge, Balloon Relay and Cup Tower Chaos all add energy, laughter and teamwork to the week. Whether students were competing, collaborating or simply cheering one another on, these activities reinforced the values of participation and belonging that lie at the heart of boarding. The planned family day trivia Kahoot also extends that sense of connection beyond the house. This event brought our rural families together virtually and strengthened the bridge between home and boarding. We look forward to implementing more family events in the future.

Ultimately, National Boarding Week is a chance to pause and recognise what boarding really means: not just accommodation, but community; not just care, but companionship; not just routine, but belonging. The warmth, gratitude and purpose woven through this week's program reflect the best of boarding life, and the heartfelt thanks expressed to staff, students and families capture exactly why these communities matter so much to our St Paul's community.

Music and Drama Spotlight

Year 7 Music students have been exploring ensembles and orchestras, developing their understanding of how musicians work together to create expressive performances. Through studying works such as In the Hall of the Mountain King and Ode to Joy, students have developed skills in recognising instrument families and note values, and applied these through performances on guitar and piano. They also connected their learning to contemporary contexts, including video game music, showing growing creativity and confidence.



Stage 5 Music students have explored how composers are inspired by space, comparing Holst's The Planets with John Williams' Star Wars theme while developing their analysis, performance, and composition skills. Student groups are learning to perform songs with a space theme.

In Stage 5 Drama, students have become theatre-makers, forming their own innovative companies and creating performances to perform for a local primary school. Through collaboration, improvisation, and rehearsal, they have developed original works while investigating how practitioners challenge conventions, resulting in dynamic and thoughtfully devised theatrical experiences.



Year 9/10 Outdoor Education - The Wilderness Code

Year 9/10 Outdoor Education students have been putting their skills into practice in the Wilderness Code unit this term. They have explored how to use Trangia for cooking, starting with making hot chocolates, learnt basic emergency first aid responses, and developed skills in building outdoor shelters in the bush.

This week, students ventured to the Magic Forest at Stanley to apply what they have learnt. The excursion included a shorter hike through the area, where students observed a variety of mushrooms and fungi, experienced the impressive redwood (Magic) forest, and explored the surrounding environment, enjoying their cooked lunch.

Students demonstrated creativity and responsibility while successfully completing all challenges.

Students then travelled across to Teys Feedlot at Stockinbingal, where students were privileged to have a very comprehensive tour of the facilities and further their knowledge and understanding of the beef feedlot industry and the processes that occur prior to stock entering the Teys abattoir at Wagga Wagga.

Students then spent the next two days based around Leeton in the MIA. Students visited the Voyager Malt House, Rice Farm and Breeding tour, Southern Cotton Gin and the final stop on the tour was Australian Grains Technologies at Collingullie.

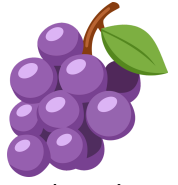

Consent & Respectful Relationships



As children and young people mature, their understanding of relationships, boundaries and respect continues to evolve. Learning about consent is not a single conversation, but an ongoing process shaped by everyday interactions, social influences and guidance from trusted adults. While these topics can sometimes feel challenging to navigate, they play an essential role in supporting young people to form safe, healthy and respectful relationships.

Consent extends beyond sexual activity and is closely linked to communication, empathy and mutual respect in all relationships. In today's social and digital world, young people can face complex situations that require clear understanding and confidence to navigate. Consistent, age-appropriate messages from both home and school help reinforce what respectful behaviour looks like in practice.

By engaging with this topic, families are encouraged to build confidence in having calm, open conversations at home. When schools and families work together to reinforce shared values and expectations, young people are better equipped to understand boundaries, respect others and make informed choices that support their wellbeing now and into the future.

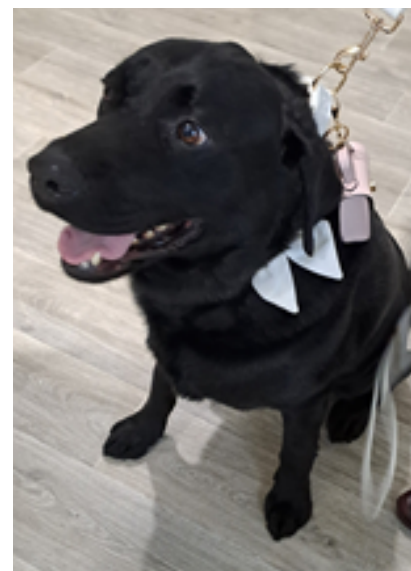
Alumni Wedding Celebration
