**Our Crest** 

Our College Crest is rich in symbolism:

The Circle – symbolises the partnership of College, families and church, community and Trinity.

The Eucalyptus Tree – able to survive in very dry conditions, symbolises the indomitable Australian spirit of perseverance in difficulty, and of our Australian heritage. The gum nuts remind us that life can and does emerge from unexpected sources; even in dryness there is life. The eucalyptus leaves redolent, useful, ubiquitous, speak to us of our Patron, St Mary MacKillop, Australia's first saint. These leaves are featured on the medal which was struck in her honour, on the occasion of her Beatification, in February 1995.

The Southern Cross – symbol of our Australian heritage and a reminder of God's redeeming love for the people of this land.

The Brindabella Mountains – remind us of our location in the Tuggeranong Valley of Canberra. More importantly, they symbolise the bridge of unity which extends between both campuses of our College.

# Wanniassa

## The Junior Campus

The Wanniassa Campus accommodates students for Years 7, 8 and 9.

The Year 7 program is based on principles of belonging and of integrated learning. Year 7 students are placed in a pastoral class belonging to one of the Houses: Gurabang, Meup Meup, Mindygari or Ngadyung. This pastoral class remains together for Integrated Humanities, which includes Religious Education, English and Studies of Society and Environment. The curriculum offered to students in Year 7 meets the requirements of the Australian Curriculum in the core areas of English, Mathematics, Science, and History.

Students also undertake studies in the areas of Modern Languages, Science, Art, Food and Textiles, Music, Physical Education and Health and Technology.

Year 8 students have pastoral classes based on House groups. In Year 8, students undertake study in the core areas as well as being able to choose from a range of elective courses.

In Year 9, students have a greater choice of courses. All students undertake the Australian Curriculum in English, Mathematics, Science, and History, as well as studying Religious Education and Physical Education. The range of elective courses in Year 9 is much more varied.

To support the breadth of curriculum offered at the Wanniassa Campus, an excellent range of facilities exist. These include music rooms, a theatrette, gymnasium, kitchens, science and technology laboratories, art and textiles rooms and computer laboratories. The library and science labs are currently undergoing an extensive refurbishment.

An extensive team of support staff including counsellors, technical assistants and teacher aides assist students and teachers within and outside the classroom.

#### **Enrichment and Challenge**

The College seeks to address the needs of all students. In Year 7, students are placed in mixed ability classes for all subjects except Mathematics, where small remedial classes are offered to students who require additional assistance. Within each class, the teacher seeks to challenge and extend individual students and support others who need additional help with their studies. Students with learning difficulties may also receive assistance in the classroom from teacher aides.

In Year 8, Extension and Support classes have been added in English and Mathematics. These additional classes have been introduced in those subject areas where literacy and numeracy are crucial, and to offer further extension and support to students. Students in Years 7-9 who are identified as gifted are invited to participate in a separate program to challenge and enrich their educational experiences.

In Year 9, students are placed in Mathematics, English and Science classes concomitant with their ability and application to studies. In other subject areas, students have a great deal of choice as to units studied. This way they are able to select units that suit their abilities and interests.

At Wanniassa, students are encouraged to engage in a range of leadership and co-curricula opportunities, including Student Representative Council, musical productions, sport clubs and the band program.



## Isabella

## The Senior Campus



The Isabella Campus accommodates students in Years 10, 11 and 12.

The senior campus provides a variety of curriculum options. In Year 10 students undertake study in the core areas of Religious Education, English, Mathematics, Physical Education, Science and Studies of Society and Environment, as well as being able to choose from a wide range of elective units. In Year 10 students are placed in Mathematics and English classes concomitant with their ability and application to studies. In other subject areas, students have a great deal of choice as to units studied. In this way students are able to select units that suit their abilities and interests. It is important for Year 10 students to have a sound understanding of their academic strengths so that, when they arrive at their senior studies, appropriate choices can be made. Year 10 students undertake formal counselling with their parents in order to help inform their decisions regarding senior studies.

In Years 11 and 12 students undertake a program of study designed to provide a pathway to the workforce or tertiary study. All courses offered in Years 11 and 12 are accredited and approved by the ACT Board of Senior Secondary Studies. It is compulsory for students enrolled at MacKillop to study English, Mathematics, and Religious Education in Year 11. In Year 12, students are required to study English. Mathematics, however, will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

Students with aspirations to attend university are offered a wide range of tertiary subjects as well as choices in Accredited and Vocational subject areas including Information Technology, Fashion Design, Hospitality, Media, Music, Business Administration and Furniture Construction. Individual student packages are developed to meet the needs of each student. Counselling is provided for all students to ensure their package is appropriate and that it will prepare the student for future career options.

Specialist facilities on the Isabella Campus include well-equipped science laboratories, two commercial kitchens, textile and art rooms, industrial technology workshops and Trade Training Centre, gymnasium, drama, dance and music rooms, a comprehensive Information Resource Centre and computer laboratories complete with modern equipment.

Staff promote an atmosphere conducive to learning, are approachable and encourage students to achieve their potential. Pastoral structures exist to ensure students are cared for and enhance the bonds that form between students and staff.

Students are encouraged to develop leadership skills in a range of activities and programs on offer at the College. These include camps and retreats, the Student Representative Council, drama, musical productions, the opportunity to play in or coach a variety of sporting teams, and to become involved in outreach programs in feeder primary schools.

# **Opportunities**

## Curricula

#### **Years 7 - 10**

#### Year 7 Integrated Humanities

In Year 7 students study Integrated Humanities (IHum). IHum includes Religious Education, English and Studies of Society and the Environment. Integrating these subjects offers a holistic approach to learning. A significant benefit for students is that the transition into High School is made easier by reducing the number of teachers and subjects.

#### **Core Subjects**

All students in Years 7 to 10 study Religious Education, English, Mathematics, Science, SOSE, Physical Education and Pastoral Program. This selection ensures students are engaging in a broad educational package in these key years.

In Years 9 and 10 students are able to study English and Mathematics at Level 1, 2 or 3 and choose Science subjects that provide pathways into senior units.

Teaching at MacKillop is diverse, interactive and engaging, targeting student needs. We operate on a principle of inclusion and, to meet the varying needs of students, deliver differentiated curriculum in all subjects. Similarly, assessment takes a variety of forms, allowing students to demonstrate their strengths over each semester. Student progress is reported to parents at the end of each semester.

#### **Electives Range**

To foster different skills and talents, MacKillop offers students a wide choice in elective subjects with specialist teachers and facilities. These include Food and Textiles, Information and Communication Technology, Modern Languages, Performing Arts, Technology (industrial), and Visual Arts. In Year 7, students experience each of these electives for a term. From Year 8, students are encouraged to make subject choices that build on their strengths and interests.





#### **Tutorials**

In order to assist students with their studies, Mathematics tutorials are conducted by staff on a weekly basis. Tutorial assistance is also provided by a number of faculties at peak assessment times.

#### Years 11 - 12

In Years 11 and 12 students can choose from a wide variety of Tertiary (T), Accredited (A), Vocational (V), and Higher Education (H) courses. Studying any of these courses at a Senior level will qualify the student for a Year 12 Certificate. Only T and H courses qualify students for an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR).

#### The Vocational Program

In addition to the Vocational subjects, ASBA (Australian School based Apprenticeships) Programs are available. Currently, MacKillop students are involved in areas of Automotive, Hairdressing, Hospitality, Retail, Spray Painting/Panel Beating, Community Pharmacy and Aged Care. Students who undertake vocational studies may participate in work placements and may qualify to receive a nationally recognised certificate.

#### The External Linkages Program

The ANU Secondary College and the Canberra School of Music are external agencies that work in conjunction with MacKillop to enable talented or high performing students to study concurrently with each agency while at school.

#### Year 12 AST Program

All Year 12 students who are seeking university entrance participate in a weekly program aimed at preparing them for the Australian Scaling Test (AST). This includes workshops related to the Writing Task, Short Answer Response and Multiple Choice Tests.

## Co-Curricula

St Mary MacKillop College considers education as more encompassing than providing a sound curriculum within the classroom. With parents, we strive to provide a balanced education that not only prepares students academically but also physically, socially and spiritually.

Supporting the formal curriculum, the College provides a range of co-curricula opportunities for students to further explore their interests and talents. Since co-curricula activities are usually conducted out of normal school hours, students are able to work with their peers in a less formal environment. These valuable opportunities are made possible by the generous support of teachers, parents and friends of the College.

The College has a long tradition of involvement in sports, debating, public speaking, musicals, Duke of Edinburgh Award Program, liturgy, camps, retreats and youth ministry.

Students enjoy participating in competitive and social sports including swimming, cross country, athletics, netball, softball, basketball, squash, cricket, tennis, hockey and the various codes of football. The College competes in carnivals and events organised by the Associated Southern Colleges and ACT Secondary Schools Sports Association.

MacKillop students are also given the opportunity to participate in the sport of fencing after the College created a program in conjunction with the ACT Fencing Association in 2009.

Students are able to learn musical instruments through the Musicorp program, which operates on the Wanniassa Campus. There are senior and junior band programs as well as student choirs.

Camps and retreats provide an invaluable opportunity for students to associate with each other and with staff in an informal learning environment. These activities also allow students to further explore areas of their development such as teamwork and personal faith.

Formal leadership opportunities exist for students from Years 7 to 12 in the Student Representative Council. Students assist in the leadership of the College, campus or one of the Houses. The SRC oversees our outreach program that fundraises for local and national charities and organises events for students, including fundraisers, fashion parades and variety night.

Programs such as the Science and Engineering Challenge, Tournament of the Minds, RoboCup, and Debating, among others, offer opportunities for extension and for exploring new interests.





## **Home and College**



St Mary MacKillop College recognises that parents are the primary educators of their children and aims to support them in the education process.

A number of formal and informal opportunities exist at St Mary MacKillop College to assist teachers and parents in working together in the education and welfare of their children. Parents are always welcome at College and campus functions such as liturgies, presentation assemblies and information evenings. These occasions help provide parents with a taste of the life of the College as well as an opportunity to meet and speak with each other and staff. This informal interaction is integral to the life of the MacKillop community.

Formal communication between College and home is also of high importance. Through publications such as newsletters, mail-outs, and the College website, the College is able to inform families of College news, upcoming events, important information and relevant issues.



Our student diary assists with the day to day communication between home and College. Parents and teachers communicate through the diary if and when the need arises. At times it may be necessary for either a teacher or parent to initiate an appointment.

Formal progress interviews involving student, parents and subject teachers are conducted in Terms 1 and 3. Within this forum, student progress and related matters are discussed in an atmosphere of collaboration. At the end of each semester a formal report for each student is prepared and posted home. This report provides an overview of student performance and progress throughout the semester.



The College Board is a key body in the administration of the College. Its membership consists of staff and parent representatives and feedback from Board meetings is published in the College Newsletter.

St Mary MacKillop College is part of the wider Catholic community within the Tuggeranong Valley. Parish Priests are actively involved in the school and provide invaluable support in the classroom, on retreats and in other aspects of the sacramental life of the College.

To further support students, professional counsellors, a Defence Force Transition Mentor, and Indigenous Home School Liaison Officer are located at both the Wanniassa and Isabella Campuses.

# **Quality Conduct**

### The Catholic School



It is a requirement that students of St Mary MacKillop College conduct themselves in a manner which shows respect and support for staff, for their peers and for their environment. Parents are viewed as the first teachers of their children and thus are an essential link in assisting students to meet College expectations.

The College is committed to the spiritual, physical, emotional and mental welfare of staff and students. To this end it seeks to affirm students whose conduct is responsible and redirect those whose behaviour is inappropriate.

Pastoral Care Policies within the College seek to promote growth, self-worth and dignity through:

- The merit system.
- · Focused pastoral care programs.
- Participation in social justice action within the College and the wider community.
- Acknowledgement of good works and achievements through notes in the Diary, merit points, certificates, status awards, MacKillop reward tokens, assemblies and end of semester presentations.

The Quality Conduct Policy, based on restorative justice processes, seeks to have students understand that with rights come responsibilities. Students have the right to be treated with courtesy and with justice but must also accept responsibility for self-discipline and for accepting that poor decisions and inappropriate behaviour have consequences.

Management of inappropriate behaviour includes:

- Communication with parents and guardians.
- Consultation with relevant Pastoral staff such as Pastoral Care teachers, Pastoral Care Coordinators, Counsellors, Assistant Principal Pastoral Care and Campus Head.
- Interviews with school personnel and outside agencies.
- · Counselling of students.

Consequences for inappropriate or unacceptable behaviour include:

- A report of the incident inserted in the student's file
- Restorative meetings and reflective letters.
- Removal of privileges i.e. school excursions, College representation, access to physical resources and use of school equipment/ facilities.
- College detention school hours post-school hours.
- In-house suspension.
- Suspension.
- Exclusion (as per CEO guidelines).

Acts of violence, vandalism, discrimination, racial vilification, harassment, bullying or intimidation are unacceptable and will not be tolerated. Students may not be in possession of weapons of any kind at school or when involved with school-related activities.



St Mary MacKillop College strives to be a "no drugs" College. No student may be in possession of or receipt of illegal substances, alcohol or cigarettes at school, travelling to or from school, when engaged in a school activity or when representing the school at any sporting or other extra-curricular activity.

A student may be required to make available for inspection their school bag or locker if directed by the Principal, Campus Head or other senior member of staff. Lockers remain the property of the College.

# Why Mackillop?

## Frequently Asked Questions

#### QUESTION: Will my child be welcome?

ANSWER: MacKillop celebrates the fact that we offer more places in Year 7 than any other secondary school in Canberra. Fifty per cent of our students belong to a faith tradition other than Catholic, over 30 primary schools are represented at MacKillop, and our low fee structure and significant financial support of families means that we are a genuinely inclusive community.

#### QUESTION: Will co-education benefit my child?

ANSWER: Yes! Learning is a lifelong experience. Learning in kindergarten and early childhood centres is coeducational, most K-6 primary schools are co-educational, and CIT and university are both co-educational, as is the work place.

Boys and girls learn together at MacKillop, promoting a mutual respect for gender difference, cohesive intellectual energy, and a learning community that best reflects the society our students belong to and are being prepared to one day lead.

#### QUESTION: How will the faith life of MacKillop benefit my child?

ANSWER: The faith tradition of your family will be respected and honoured. MacKillop respects the contribution each student, teacher, and their families can make to building an inclusive, welcoming faith life that promotes the life, teaching, and example of Jesus Christ and the Church He gave us.

At the heart of a MacKillop education is the idea of a loving God; the trust, affection, consideration, and sacrifice we show each other are some signs of the presence of the Kingdom of God in all of us.

#### QUESTION: What will the teachers be like?

ANSWER: The teachers of MacKillop vary in age, experience, academic background, interests, and cultural pursuits. They are united in their dedication to the Catholic mission of the College, the achievement of optimum results for their students, the creation of a positive learning environment, and to ensuring that no child slips through the cracks in this large, vibrant school. The best thing about MacKillop is the staff.

#### QUESTION: How will I be included in my child's MacKillop education?

ANSWER: Parents are listened to at MacKillop! Of course we have regular academic and pastoral reporting, information evenings, a College Board with strong parent representation, open assemblies, welcoming liturgies, newsletters, and websites, which are all available to parents.

A parent can expect to be able to meet with and talk to their child's teachers, have phone calls promptly returned, emails responded to, interviews arranged, and to have their questions, hopes, concerns, and anxieties listened to and acted upon. At MacKillop, we recognise parents as the first and best teachers of your children.

#### QUESTION: What projects do you have in plan for the near future?

ANSWER: In 2011, St Mary MacKillop College began construction on several projects that will enhance the resources at the College's disposal.

The Isabella Campus has seen the development of a new Trade Training Centre, which has extended its stellar Vocational Educational facilities. The refurbishment of the Wanniassa Campus Library into a state-of-the-art facility will support the College's commitment to critical learning and research, the use of the latest technologies to support that learning, and to sustain the College as a community of readers. In addition, the science laboratories and classrooms at Wanniassa will undergo extensive refurbishment in 2011, which will underpin the outstanding teaching of science at MacKillop.

The major ICT project for 2011 and beyond is the laptop rollout. Year 7 students will each receive a laptop or netbook computer as part of the Federal Government's 'Digital Education Revolution'.

These exciting projects are providing MacKillop students with more opportunities than ever before!
