Catherine Murphy ALUMNI 1970'S

Hi Brigidine! I felt the need to write to you...

I was a Brigidine pupil back in the 70's and I was a constant cause of alarm for the nuns. My name is Catherine Murphy (Cate) and despite my extremely rocky road through my schooling I have been successful in the service sector, first qualifying as a then called Psychiatric nurse, and now I run a large disability employment service. My path has always been one of fighting for social justice. I am now 62 years old and working from home (as so many of us are) and trying to hold it all together for my marginalised customers in a rural northern NSW area. I am also finally doing my university degree.

I wanted to touch base because I think we are all reaching out to one another and wanted to say to the Brigidine community, that even though I was trouble when I was there, my passion for social justice was never dampened by the nuns. I was given credit where due and there was never any backlash when I revolted against the reins being pulled in on me. I loved Brigidine and always think fondly upon my years there. Unfortunately, I have not remained in contact with anyone from that time, but think of them all often.

I know that Brigidine will support everyone to the best of their ability. I credit the school and the nuns with allowing me to be who I am and giving me the strength, courage and compassion to overcome and transform and give back in a meaningful way. I have a big story that plunges into alcoholism and out again, but my faith never wavered, it is a faith in the knowledge that everything will be ok. It got me through and I firmly believe that if I had a different schooling background I may not have believed in myself the way Brigidine taught me to... even if they didn't know they were.

As Principal, I believe that the busiest and most challenging days should be met with a calm, well humoured and professional approach. I am committed to advancing opportunities for students through their experiences in holistic education encompassing their faith, academic and pastoral life. I am privileged to lead the College in these aspects.

I am honoured to be part of such a dynamic learning community here at St. Ives. I look forward to continuing to meet our Alumni and families and to working alongside you to provide the best educational opportunities for your daughter.

We have found that *'necessity is a great teacher'*

Whilst it has been an enormous challenge to change our mode of delivering lessons, our teachers and students have embraced remote learning opportunities with a positive attitude.

Personally, this pandemic has provided me with an opportunity to reinvent myself as an educator; as the saying goes, necessity is a great teacher!

I have also realised why teachers will never be out of a job and can't be replaced by robots, because learning is essentially a social exercise and building a sense of community is much more challenging when we are all sitting behind an interface. Learning is a collective experience; it isn't an individual pursuit. As John Donne wrote: 'no man is an island'. So, whilst I am very pleased that because we live in 2020 and therefore have the tools we need to continue to provide our students with quality teaching and learning experiences, the isolation that is associated with being a solo voyager is impacting our community on an emotional level.

Every day that I am working remotely, I am reminded precisely why schools are so important; as educators, we provide our students with a sense of belonging, connection, routine, psychological safety, normality and structure.

From the outset, I conveyed to the staff that we cannot expect that remote learning will ever be able to fully replicate the dynamism and sense of community which one receives when being part of a school. Article 26 of the UN Declaration of Human Rights is about education, and it reminds us that one of the most important aspects of education is: the full development of the human personality. That is why my colleagues and I are really looking forward to the day when school-life will return to normal, so that we can reinstitute assemblies, clubs, carnivals, liturgies, excursions, rites of passage, incursions; all of which are integral to the holistic development of our students. We know that any change in learning design requires prototyping and it is iterative, as such, after our first week of remote learning, we made changes to the timetable. These amendments were wellreceived because they allowed for more time for students to refresh between each lesson.

This was undoubtedly a positive move but as a leader of learning and a parent (who has two children who are now learning from home) I am acutely aware of the fact that even a change to our timetable will not be able to alleviate the fact that families are also managing the emotional and psychological stressors that are associated with living through a pandemic. The reality is that none of us have been habituated into this new normal.


An additional challenge which schools continue to face is the extent to which our students engage in either asynchronous (literally not keeping time together) or synchronous learning: is learning in real time (such as Zoom).

At the end of Term 1, I encouraged our teachers to adopt more of the asynchronous approach, this requires students to access information, demonstrate what they've learned, and communicate with classmates without necessarily being in the same classroom or even in the same time zone to participate. It has also been referred to as 'location independent learning'. Teachers have continued to prepare engaging and interactive learning tasks, which promote higher order thinking. However, these tasks need not necessarily occur in real time. Some of the tasks students have engaged in have been: recording a presentation or slideshow, collaborating tasks and documents in the cloud, discussions on boards, portfolio or project-based learning, quizzes using interactive platforms, such as Firefly, Socrative, Maths Space and Education Perfect and activities which do not require students to be on a screen. reading a book or article, watching a film which is relevant to a particular subject area. Teachers may create online group spaces for small groups of students and ask them to support and consult with one another before sending emails to you directly.

Teachers are still able to check-in with their mentor groups and classes and staff are still engaging with students, providing feedback and support where required.

Research into effective online learning has demonstrated that: "Asynchronous Learning is the key feature of successful online learning programs" (Elizabeth Trach). This is primarily because this type of learning allows flexibility for learners as it easily accommodates different learning styles, as students can often "choose their own adventure" when it comes to the order they wish to cover material and how deep to dive into a given topic.

I have learned that communication really is the key, as well as the ability for students to be supported in creating weekly learning targets and make plans for all subjects so that teachers can pre-empt potential challenges which might emerge. We want to be able to ensure that students feel a level of success each week; and this will look different for every student.



The Brigidine approach to remote learning: strength and gentleness online

Week 8

MARCH 16

After our return from camps and retreats, the College sensed the pending move to online learning and began to survey the students and teachers about their knowledge, skills and attitudes to working online. We found that students were very positive about this possible change to routine, though some had misgivings about their home wifi service. Teachers mostly felt confident but needed more information.

Teachers were set up with Zoom accounts and given training in the use of video conferencing software. A staff meeting was held which devoted time to ICT training and the sharing of information about managing online learning. This was well received by teachers, who felt better prepared. In that week, teachers also created Teams for their classes and mentor groups, enabling students to actively participate and be social in less formal ways if required. Our ICT Team facilitated all these changes with a sense of urgency and commitment.

Training was provided by the Teacher-Librarians for those teachers needing additional skills in the software and systems needed for teaching online. This training was provided at school and through some ICT Help pages lodged in Firefly. These included: using Microsoft Teams, Firefly Task setting and uploading, task marking techniques, recording audio onto Powerpoint slides, screen recording, screencasting and video-making, as well as a range of other things people needed to know!

Week 9

MARCH 24

Brigidine College commenced teaching using the Remote Learning model, adhering to standard timetabled lessons. The students who attended school on campus also participated in this model and their classes were attended from the Kinkead Library. Over the course of that week, all students moved to learning from home. In response to some feedback about time management, the school moved to a modified timetable, which allowed for longer recovery breaks between lessons, and a longer lunch break to enable physical activity and interaction within the family home. The transition to the Remote Learning model happened relatively smoothly. Within Zoom, teachers have successfully experimented with screen sharing and managing their classrooms in ways such as using breakout rooms, screen chat and other sharing options. Using a combination of the Firefly Learning management system, Sentral, Teams, Google Classroom, Zoom, email, Libguides, Library eResources, Education Perfect, Literatu, Mathspace, and Office 365 apps for collaboration, students and teachers have engaged with a wide range of learning and research tools and had a variety of educational experiences.

New skills have been learned, new strengths have been found, and all the while the entire school community exhibited kindness and care for each other. Our senior Student Leadership team together with Year 12 had the exciting opportunity of launching our theme to lead and inspire the year ahead. It was a new decade and a new beginning. Please join with us to celebrate our '2020 Vision - See the Magic.'

Cinderella was the first to tell us: "Have courage and be kind... where there is kindness, there is goodness and where there is goodness, there is magic..." Our Charity Launch in February was a highlight in my life, to work together as a team and have our school community warmly embrace and celebrate our theme was everything Year 12 had hoped for. But it also came with tears as we shared the Charity focus which was near to our hearts; 'Feel the Magic', a beautiful organization which provides grief education and support to bereaved children and their families to help alleviate the pain and isolation felt by the loss of a loved one. Never in my wildest dreams would I have believed that 2020 would see us experience Drought, Fires, Floods and a Pandemic that found many isolated and lives lost with no care to race, religion, class, gender or politics. It offered a startling reminder of our fragility and interconnectedness. Globally it was a year that showed the impact of leadership and teamwork. Working for the love of humanity were our first responders, healthcare workers, firefighters, police officers and defence forces. Essential workers, educators, community services, food services, transport, government and more. I discovered that good leadership was integral to getting us through but more importantly, teamwork was important to the success of all leaders.

What has emerged are new insights, fresh perspectives, gratitude and the knowledge that we are stronger than we'd suspected. In the words of JK Rowling: "We all have magic inside us." Our final year of high school will be changed forever but our ultimate goal as senior leaders will remain unchanged: to offer mateship with spirit and soul. With courage and compassion we transform our lives and our world for the better. We have faced the unprecedented challenge of remote learning which initially seemed really disappointing because many of our exciting initiatives were consequentially cancelled despite being vital to the fundraising for our charity; our Op shop initiative where Year 12 would donate clothes for younger students to buy, or lunchtime disco plans, contributing to our charity in fun ways. It is also very difficult to raise money when the majority of people are facing great economic struggles - however, it is equally as important to raise awareness for our charity during this time and its focus on addressing grief and mental illness. So, we hope to keep 'Feel the Magic' alive within our community by garnering a significant understanding of grief and staying closely connected with every single student. By sending out funny Easter videos and recognising students who are trying hard to keep spirits high, we hope to maintain the Brigo spirit as though we're still back at school.

This experience has taught us student leaders that when things don't go to plan, the answer is not to take a back seat and see how things pan out. Ultimately, this has been an experience that has developed our ability to respond to adversity, but more importantly, it has inspired us to keep the flame alive and make sure that all students feel connected to their community.

Memorable speech by Ella Coakes

When our Year 12 student, Ella gave a speech at the launch of this year's Year 12 Charity she brought the whole school community to their feet. The following is an extract of her wonderful and brave speech...



Year 12's charity this year is '*Feel The Magic*', an organisation that runs camps for children aged 7-17 who are suffering from the loss of a parent, sibling or legal guardian. I heard about the camp about 6 months after my dad died four years ago, and was adamant that I wouldn't go. I didn't want to acknowledge, let alone talk about my own grief with a group of strangers, but eventually I got to the point where I needed to connect with people, and reluctantly agreed to go.

Feel The Magic pairs each camper with a mentor, someone who may not have necessarily had the same grief experience, but is a similar personality with similar interests. I don't know how they work this out, but my mentor Ash was perfect for me. The campers are divided into age groups and given mentors. The four girls from my group had all lost their fathers, and we all formed such a strong connection. The camp combines group therapy and regular camp activities. It's incredible watching all these people go from discussing highly emotional and confronting topics to playing a game of footy.

I wasn't sure about the Memorial Service where you write a note to your dead person and then burn it, the ashes being theoretically carried up to your loved ones while listening to Coldplay. I was upset but actually found it really helped. This was the first time I really acknowledged I had lost not just my dad, but him as a person - the jokes, the hugs, the future memories I will never get to make - and allowed myself to grieve.

There is a stigma surrounding grief which contributes to the

isolation that occurs after the loss of a loved one. People clam up when they find out why my dad's not around, and become incredibly uncomfortable when I talk about him. The power of Camp Magic lies in its ability to dismantle the taboo of death and provide the grieving within a community where loss is normal, and discussion regarding death is encouraged. The camp has not only allowed me to confront my own experience, but has fostered my emotional intelligence and ability to recognise and talk about how I'm feeling, even in aspects of my life not pertaining to grief. For a lot of kids this is the only kind of therapy or professional emotional support they are ever going to get. There are some kids who wouldn't be able to afford this camp if it wasn't offered free to campers. Some kids are circling in the foster care system who will likely never get any kind of therapy except for what they receive on the camp. Who you live with and how much money you have should not determine whether or not you get support. Thankfully Camp Magic is catering for all grieving children. People who have lost a loved one before the age of 18 are three times more likely to take their own life, and 30-40% more likely to be hospitalised for depression. There is an evident need for society to accept and address the reality of mental health issues within the grieving community, and Camp Magic is allowing grieving kids to acknowledge their sadness, that they do not always feel good, instead of being expected to keep silent. I know this camp is saving lives. It is helping to break down the social stigma whereby grief and mental health are too confronting to be spoken about, by enabling a community of young people who care enough about themselves and other people to acknowledge that their own mental health is relevant and important, and talk about their own emotions. Pre-camp: I would just pretend I was fine. Now my friends from camp and I have genuine discussions about how we are actually feeling, and we aren't afraid to just simply say "I'm having a bad day".

For someone who loses not only their parent, or sibling, but decades of future memories, Camp Magic is an incredible community. Over 160,000 children lose a loved one every year, and Camp Magic can only accommodate 1000 children annually. This leaves 159,000 kids without the community that I honestly think I would not have recovered without. It costs \$1000 to send a camper and their mentor to the camp for three days. I thank you in advance for what you contribute, and I want you to know that this is a charity that I know from experience has changed my life, and the lives of thousands of kids like me.

I was the College Captain at Brigidine College in 1992 and went on to study Media and Communications at Macquarie University. I've been a film and television producer for the past twenty-five years.



One of the things I love about my work is that I get to tell stories – whether they are told over 30 seconds or 5 hours. I love working with creative people like writers, directors and actors, and I love bringing teams of creative people together to tell a story and create a vision. I love entertaining people – which is definitely something I developed a love of while I was at Brigidine, through the band, the annual musical performances and the Year 11 play.

I started out producing television commercials, music videos and short films, which is where I learnt "how" to produce. A lot of my short films and music videos were very low budget (or no budget!), so while they didn't make me money, they allowed me to get the experience I needed, and these were often my most bold artistic projects.


Over my career I have had the opportunity to work with some amazing people, both in front of, and behind the camera. The first short film I produced, *Tulip*, was back in 1998, and it was written and directed by Rachel Griffiths and starred the wonderful Bud Tingwell. In 2003 I co-produced *The Rage in Placid Lake* starring Rose Byrne and musician Ben Lee in his first acting role; in 2007 I produced *The Square* written by Joel Edgerton (who also starred in the film) and Matthew Dabner, and directed by Nash Edgerton; and in 2017 I executive produced *Dance Academy: The Movie* starring the wonderful cast from the successful ABC TV show.

The life of a producer is a roller coaster, like any creative career it's full of both rejection and triumphs. Some years you are stuck in the land of development and you feel like nothing is ever going to get financed, other years you are on location filming for months at a time, working 24/7 and wondering if you will ever get a break, and then other years, you get to travel the world screening your work at international festivals, hoping they love it as much as you do.

A few years ago, I produced the telemovie *Riot*, and I was honoured to meet with and interview many of the activists known as the "78ers" who were instrumental in organising the first Mardi Gras parade in 1978. It was incredibly special to hear their personal stories and to be able to shape and mould these into a 90-minute telemovie for the ABC. They aired it the week before the 40th Anniversary of the Mardi Gras and watching it with some of the original LGBTQI campaigners was a truly memorable moment in my career.

Most recently I produced *The End*, a ten-part series that has screened on Sky in the UK and will screen on Foxtel later this year, so please make sure to watch it when it goes to air!



One lost all their sporting equipment and the other sustained significant damage to fencing and livestock in their agriculture program.

As part of the College's response to this, our wonderful community joined to help these two schools. The girls held bake sales every Friday for four weeks and our P&F donated the funds from the raffle held at the Welcome Cocktail Party at the end of February. Collectively we raised \$6000 which was donated to both schools. *Well done Brigidine !*

Our new Business Networking Directory

Term two saw the launch of an initiative aimed at supporting College families during the Covid-19 global challenge. We were aware many of our families run businesses or provide services within the local and surrounding areas and wanted to encourage our College community to support them wherever possible. The Brigidine College St Ives Business Networking Directory is aimed at allowing current parents to list their business or service in a directory which will be sent out to the whole College community via email.

The initiative was in direct response to the Covid-19 situation and the first edition of the directory was issued in week one of Term 2.

She has kindly contributed to Gentle Voices remembering the establishment of Chisholm Centre; below is an extract from Jill's experiences with Brigidine College.

'One of the highlights of my time at Brigidine was the establishment of The Chisholm Centre, during John Bowie's term as Principal of the College. The Centre was founded in 2000 as a support for children with special needs, established by Nola McMullen and Donna Littlewood with just three students entering Year 7; Sally Ferris, Mary Maclean and Carlie Crino. Robyn O'Bryen OAM joined the next year as the first teacher's aide.

I feel the Centre had a profound effect on the whole Brigidine community. The Chisholm Centre students were embraced by the other students, mentoring them, and demonstrating a policy of inclusiveness, both inside and outside the classroom. I remember these Chisholm students as cheerful, and sometimes, cheeky...they embraced the school curriculum, enjoyed studying basic skills and life skills. They practiced banking and shopping, and cooking... the girls ran a café for staff putting these skills to practice.' I always looked forward to this very popular event on the weekly school calendar.

Jill's recollection has become part of our archival collection, and is a valuable resource for our understanding and celebration of many aspects of our College history; the development of campus, the changes to curriculum, opportunities for learning support, and the attitudes, activities and achievements of our students. The Archives would like to thank Jill for her support both through her contribution and volunteering.


