


# 2023 PERFORMANCE REPORT ELC to Year 12

### **Our Story**

For over one and a half centuries, pioneer Lutheran faith has been a feature of the Barossa Valley landscape.

Amongst church spires and vineyards, the passion for quality education has been instilled in the hearts and minds of the generations before us.

In 1845, the first Barossa Lutheran School opened in Tanunda. 'Langmeil School' (Langmeil Schüle, later to become known as Tanunda Lutheran School), was the first step in our unending pursuit of an education that brings something extra to the ordinary.

In 1985, as the Barossa Valley celebrated 140 years of Lutheran education, courage and faith guided the opening of 'Faith Lutheran Secondary School' with an inaugural class of 26 students.

Thirty-three years later, in 2018, Tanunda Lutheran School and Faith Lutheran College amalgamated to become the first ELC to Year 12 College in the region.

The collective wisdom and values of those who went before us in earlier times, is part of what has shaped our ELC – 12 College into what it is today. A College with caring Christian values, excellence in teaching and learning, and a heart for each member of our community.

Faith Lutheran College, a school of the Lutheran Church of Australia, welcomes students as three-year olds at our Maria Street Tanunda location and continues to nurture, care and develop each individual as they journey through to Year 12 at the Middle and Senior campus on Magnolia Road, and to the world beyond.

## Student attendance

## **Students**

Students at Faith Lutheran College are encouraged to develop leadership qualities and to have a 'voice' in their education. Opportunities include (but are not limited to) Year Level leaders, College leaders, Student Parliament positions, Sporting captains, Music leaders, Worship leaders, Pastoral Care and Community Service positions.

Students are supported in their quest for personal excellence through a variety of extracurricular offerings, pastoral care programs and community service programs which nurture and develop their passions, compassion and sense of belonging, locally and globally.

Faith Lutheran College is well regarded for its agricultural program, which includes wine making and reflects much of the industry in the local region. Grapes are crushed and processed by students in the Wine Education course and wine is sold under the Mengler View Wines label. Other agricultural learning programs focus on enterprises run in the local district and range from cropping, animal and viticulture units. Practical work occurs through direct experience on the College farm and is complimented by regional excursions. There are a range of co-curricular animal clubs which focus on developing student passion, animal handling and general husbandry skills. Food and Hospitality, Visual Arts, Design and Technology and Business courses cater for students with a wide variety of practical interests and passions.

Performing Arts are integral to the life of the College. A full-scale musical production is undertaken every two years with additional music, drama, dance and arts performances throughout the year.

Commencing in Year 2, Year Level camps are held throughout the year for all year levels extending students beyond the classroom and offering personal challenges and experiences. The framework for Pastoral Care and Wellbeing at Faith's Middle and Senior School is based on Village Care Groups, a vertically streamed home-group structure with students from across year levels 7-12. The Village Care Group provides a small, continuous, community environment where students feel safe, valued and accepted throughout their educational journey. Chapels are held twice weekly across the College, and students engage in experiential service learning, participating in care programs in the local area, fundraising and supporting local charitable organisations as well as overseas.

Faith employs a Restorative approach to behaviour management.

#### **Absence Management**

The College has an attendance database with comprehensive reporting and messaging integration. Parents and Caregivers must explain non-attendance. An automated text (SMS) message is sent to a nominated number and follow up phone contact is made if the College is not contacted.

Tracking of student absences is a continuous process, with weekly analysis of absentee patterns. Meetings with Parents and Caregivers, to negotiate ways to minimise the impact on learning and to facilitate a return to the College, take place in situations where the absence is prolonged or a regular pattern of absences occur.

The Student Counsellor and Village Care Group teachers provide ongoing support in these circumstances. In rare situations, where a return to the College cannot be negotiated, a report and follow up is made with the area 'Attendance Officer' (DfE). Days of absence are indicated on a student's semester report. Lesson attendance rates are reported for each subject at Year 12.

### **Attendance Rates**

# **Benchmark Testing Results**

### NAPLAN

In Term 1 (between 18 and 22 March) students in Years 3,5,7 and 9 completed the assessment. NAPLAN is just one way we assess and report on your child's development here at Faith. Other measures include formative and summative assessments, standardised testing including PAT tests and PM benchmarking, prior knowledge activities, monitoring in class progress, teacher-student conferencing, running records, teacher observations, parent teacher interviews and our bi-annual school reports in Terms 2 and 4.



# **Proficiency level descriptions**

Student achievement in NAPLAN is reported using proficiency standards for each assessment area at each year level. The standards are set at a challenging but reasonable expectation of what students know and can do at the time of testing. There are 4 proficiency levels:

Exceeding: the student's result exceeds expectations at the time of testing.

Strong: the student's result meets challenging but reasonable expectations at the time of testing.

**Developing:** the student's result indicates that they are working towards expectations at the time of testing.

**Needs additional support:** the student's result indicates that they are not achieving the learning outcomes that are expected at the time of testing. They are likely to need additional support to progress satisfactorily.






