The College commenced operations in January 2003 with a 30 acre site at the western edge of Cooroy, a charming and rapidly growing town located on the Bruce Highway just 30 minutes drive north from the Nambour / Maroochydore region and 35 minutes south of Gympie.

The College currently offers Kindergarten to Year 12.

# Our Philosophy

An education at Noosa Adventist College is designed to develop the whole person - spiritually, mentally, socially, emotionally and physically. Students are better able to reach their full potential if their learning experiences are delivered holistically, in a balanced program. To this end, Noosa Adventist College provides a well-developed academic program, health and physical education, sports activities, music and art, in addition to a foreign language (French) in Secondary. Both Primary and Secondary classes also enjoy gardening activities. Student learning takes place both inside classrooms and outside, in a beautiful and spacious campus. Bible based spiritual values are taught in Biblical Studies classes and, more importantly, are modelled consistently by caring staff.

The Golden Rule of 'treat others as you like to be treated', exemplified by Jesus' life, is the basis for social interaction at Noosa Adventist College. Tolerance, acceptance of differences and a genuine care and concern for each other are encouraged at all times. Our priority is the balanced development of your child.

## Our Learning Environment

### Location

Situated in the upper Sunshine Coast hinterland, Noosa Adventist College provides a spacious and unique learning environment in a natural bushland setting. Shady trees, extensive lawns and shrubs create an idyllic rural atmosphere and a calming environment conducive to learning. The campus has modern, well-appointed classrooms (all with air conditioning) in both the Primary and Secondary schools. Our Primary classrooms are purpose-built with adjacent play areas and a large undercover space. There are two double-storey Secondary blocks with commercial kitchen and serving eating area, laboratories, drama room, locker area, Year 12 student hub, four flexible learning classrooms plus other classrooms, amenities block and outdoor seating



area. There is a further Secondary portable classroom complex on campus and Industrial Arts facilities.

The centrally located Library Resource Centre houses the College library, Reception, meeting rooms, Counsellor, Chaplains', Teaching Assistants, Learning Diversity, IT, and Administration offices, Tuckshop, and Outside School Hours Care (OSHC).

Our semi-rural campus also allows us plenty of space for sporting activities with large oval areas, a multi-use court area (tennis/volleyball/basketball) and another basketball court on site. Our bushland and creek area at the rear of the campus also provides a scenic backdrop to our buildings and another opportunity for outdoor learning, cross country events and other activities. In this environment students of all ages will feel relaxed and comfortable, enjoying a seamless transition from Kindergarten right through to Year 12. This means that your child can complete his/her education in a familiar yet unique centre of learning.

## **Parental Involvement**

The College encourages a level of parental involvement beyond the day- to-day education of the students. While the Parents and Friends (P & F) Association is a formally organised vehicle for parent involvement, more incidental involvement is encouraged including classroom assistance, sports, cultural activities and school camps.

## **Pastoral Care**

Our Christian foundation dictates that all students are seen as having equal value. Pastoral care, the emotional support and guidance of the student, is one of our highest priorities. To this end all teachers are more than simply classroom teachers; they nurture friendships with each student. Significantly, in a small school these relationships continue from year to year. The College Chaplains and School Counsellor are also involved in the emotional, social and spiritual well-being of each student and are available for counselling, support and guidance of not just the students, but also their families.

In addition to the Chaplains, there are Student Chaplain Leaders in Primary and Secondary to assist students and organise activities such as team building games, introduce spiritual initiatives, help with Chapel services, Buddy Days etc.



## **Transport**

Cooroy is a centre of education within the upper Sunshine Coast area and an extensive network of school buses already operate throughout the region. The College also operates its own bus service across the Sunshine Coast hinterland from 'Aussie World' in the south to Gympie in the north. Bus zones and fare costs are on page 25 of this booklet.

## **Enrolment Policy**

The College is a co-educational day school currently catering for students from Kindergarten to Year 12. The College is open to students regardless of their religious affiliation, ethnic background, gender or national origin.

Children must turn 4 years of age by 30th June for Kindergarten and 5 years of age by 30th June for Prep, in the year they wish to enrol into the College's Early Learning Centre. The normal procedure for enrolment is to provide the College with the last two copies



of school reports and Naplan results and attend an interview with the Principal. Our enrolment applications are completed online at the following link: <https://www.noosacc.qld.edu.au/enrolment/>. Reports can be uploaded, paperwork signed, and payment of the \$200 application fee for each student is required when submitting the enrolment application. Once a place is offered, a non-refundable deposit of \$500 is payable. This deposit will be credited towards the first term's fees.

## Tuckshop

Noosa Adventist College P & F Association operates a vegetarian Tuckshop in the canteen facilities of the Library Resource Centre. The Tuckshop is open each Wednesday and Friday for recess and lunch with hot and fresh food, drinks and light refreshments. The menu can be found at this link:

## **Our Commitments – To Know, Relate, Imagine and Progress**

Equality, inclusion and diversity underpin our Kindergarten's programs and practice. In developing our Kindergarten program our practice is founded on the belief that:

- ✓ Children are capable and competent;
- ✓ Children actively construct their own learning;
- ✓ Learning is dynamic, complex and holistic; and
- ✓ Children can initiate and lead learning and be active participants and decision makers.

An essential ingredient to this process is our physical environment and ensuring that it promotes our commitment to learning, inclusivity, independent exploration and learning through play.





## Class Size and Age

Classes are restricted to 22 children. Children must turn 4 years of age by 30th June in the year that they are enrolled in Kindergarten. To meet requirements for entry into the funded program, the Queensland Kindergarten Funding Scheme, children must be enrolled 15hrs per week.

## Our Curriculum

The College's curriculum is based on the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority documents, incorporating the new Australian Curriculum developed by ACARA. A phased 'roll out' of the new Australian Curriculum began several years ago under the joint supervision of the QCAA and Independent Schools Queensland (ISQ). We currently work with all relevant Australian Curriculum syllabus.

## Primary Curriculum

Key Learning Areas (KLAs) offered are:

- Biblical Studies
- English
- Mathematics
- Science
- HASS (Humanities & Social Sciences) – History, Geography, Civics & Citizenship, Business & Economics
- The Arts (Music and Dance, Visual Art, Drama, Cooking, Sewing)
- Health and Physical Education
- Technologies
- Library

Students with varying levels of ability are catered for in each classroom or across classrooms. Learning support is offered to those needing help, as is a program designed to further extend the gifted and talented.



## Secondary Curriculum

In Year 7, students are engaged in a transition program studying most of their subjects in their own classroom taught by a middle school teacher. They move to other classrooms to study Design and Technology, Food and Textile Technology, Drama, Music, Language, Digital Technology, Economics and Business, Visual Art and TRIBE Program.

**Years 7 – 8:** All students study the following subjects – Biblical Studies, Mathematics, English, Science, Geography (semester), History, Health and Physical Education, Sport, Visual Art\*, Language (French), Drama\*, Design and Technologies\*, Music\*, Food and Textile Technologies\*, Digital Technology\*, Civics and Citizenship (semester), and TRIBE/HOS (Heart of Service) Programs.      \* 13 weeks of each subject

**Years 9 – 10:** All the core subjects continue, plus students choose other subject options.

### CORE SUBJECTS

#### Year 9

Biblical Studies, English, Mathematics, Science, History, Health and Physical Education (HPE), and Sport.

Year 9 Wellbeing Program: Building leadership skills, resilience, sense of belonging, team skills, service and respect.

#### Year 10

Biblical Studies, English, Mathematics, Science, Health and Physical Education (HPE), and Sport.

Year 10 students complete five full days of work experience at a local business. This opportunity gives students a valuable insight into a workplace and a taste for their potential career preferences. Year 10 students can also study Vocational (VET) Courses.

## Assessment and Reporting

Evidence of the student’s progress is gathered from a range of learning experiences throughout the year. The College uses ‘assessment for learning’ to identify and map student learning needs in addition to ‘assessment of learning’ (which is summative and used for reporting purposes). Assessment is an ongoing process and will never depend on a single task.

Grades that contribute to an overall assessment will come from a range of tasks, including individual performance in tests and assignments, group projects and reports, displays and multimodal presentations. Some work is handwritten but increasingly as students move up through the grades, student work is computer generated, particularly for assignments. Communication with parents regarding student progress is carried out both informally (usually by email) and formally, with the College reporting to the parents as follows:

## **PRIMARY**

Term 1: Interim report approximately Week 8 with parent interview.

Term 2: Final week of Term 2, with parent interview.

End Term 4: Semester two report (published through the parent communication app – SEQTA Engage). Parent interviews are available at the College the day after the end of year awards event, if required.

## **SECONDARY**

Term 1: Interim report approximately Week 8 with parent interview.

Term 2: Reports are ready in the final week of Term 2, with parent interviews conducted the week before Term 3.

End Term 4: Semester two report (published through the parent communication app – SEQTA Engage). Parent interviews are available at the College the day after the end of year awards event, if required.





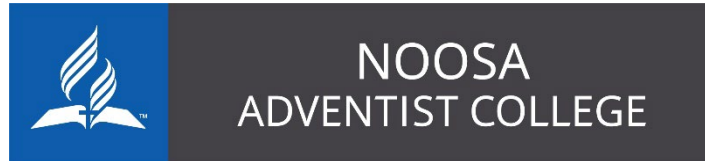

# Prep to Year 12



At Noosa Adventist College we would like to ensure that a high-quality, caring, Christian education is within reach of as many families as possible.

Our fee information document is designed to provide you with the information you need to plan your budget and is aimed at being as simple and easy as possible to understand so that you know what you are paying for.

The structure of our fees provides sibling discounts, assisting families with multiple children enrolled at our college, and our Fee Assistance\* process supports eligible low-income families.

# 2026 FEE INFORMATION

## ENROLMENT APPLICATION FEE & DEPOSIT

A non-refundable application fee of \$200 per child is required when submitting the Enrolment Form. Once a place is offered, a non-refundable deposit of \$500 is payable. This deposit will be credited towards the first term's fees.

## TUITION AND OTHER CHARGES

### PRIMARY SCHOOL

#### CLASSROOM CHARGES

Classroom resources are ordered by the College and paid for by parents before commencement of the new school year.

#### GENERAL LEVY

The General Levy helps towards the following costs:

- keeping software licensing up to date, annual compulsory sporting affiliation fees, interschool competitions; specialised class resources and equipment (e.g., data projectors, 3D printers, VR headsets, robotics and other classroom consumables), updating sports equipment, personal development/wellbeing programs, off-campus specialised classes, etc.

#### LAPTOP LEVY

The Laptop Levy helps towards the College's purchase of laptops and accessories. It also contributes towards the costs of the students' use of computers in Primary and Secondary, upgrades and repairs, and IT support for software and hardware issues.

#### ACTIVITY LEVY

This levy covers camps (Years 4-6 only) and the compulsory curriculum related excursions and incursions throughout the year. End of term and end of year break ups will be charged separately through Consent2Go.

***\* NB Students are expected to attend Camps. If your child does not attend camp, you may still need to pay the costs associated e.g., booking fee, deposit, flights etc.***

## SECONDARY SCHOOL

### CLASSROOM CHARGES

A stationery list will be provided to families for personal purchase.

### GENERAL LEVY

The General Levy helps towards the following costs:

- keeping software licensing up to date, annual compulsory sporting affiliation fees, interschool competitions; specialised class resources and equipment (e.g., data projectors, 3D printers, VR headsets, robotics and other classroom consumables), updating sports equipment, student photocopying, personal development/wellbeing programs, off-campus specialised classes, etc.

### LAPTOP LEVY

The Laptop Levy helps towards the College's purchase of laptops and accessories. It also contributes towards the costs of the students' use of computers in Primary and Secondary, upgrades and repairs, and IT support for software and hardware issues.

### CAMP LEVY

This levy covers camps only. (See the table on page 6 for the cost for each year level).

***\* NB Students are expected to attend Camps. If your child does not attend camp, you may still need to pay the costs associated e.g., booking fee, deposit, flights etc.***

### SUBJECT LEVY

This levy covers subscriptions, consumables and curriculum related excursions and incursions. End of term and end of year break ups will also be charged separately through Consent2Go. (See the table on page 5 for breakdown of charges).

### TEXTBOOK HIRE

This covers the hire of textbooks in Secondary. If books are lost or damaged, a replacement fee will be charged.

## 2026 OTHER INFORMATION

### FEE INVOICES

Invoices will be issued prior to the commencement of each school term, and you will receive an email notification advising that your fee statement has been published to the SEQTA Parent Portal. You will need to log into the Portal to view your fee statement and arrange payment, as per your signed Fee Payment Agreement.

## PAYMENT METHODS

1. Annual upfront - eligible for a 4.5% prompt payment discount\* on tuition only (less other discounts), if paid in full by due date
2. Term upfront – eligible for 4% prompt payment discount\* on tuition only (less other discounts), if paid in full by due date
3. Payment Plan – families may choose to pay by regular instalments ensuring fees are paid in full by the last day of the school year - weekly (40 payments), fortnightly (20 payments) or monthly (10 payments).
