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THE COLLEGE CREST AND **VISION FOR LEARNING**

The College derives its name from the Latin words *Corpus Christi*, which translates to 'body of Christ'. The College Crest speaks to this in multiple ways, with the Celtic cross symbolising the risen Christ, our source of joy and celebration. The white circle contained in blue symbolises the Eucharist and the thanks we give for the sacrifice of His life. The use of burgundy signifies the red wine consecrated in the Eucharistic celebration, the blood of Christ, while the blue signifies the humanity of Christ through His mother, Mary.

The Crest is completed with our motto *Sequere Dominum* – Follow the Lord – which incorporates the ideal and challenge of following Our Lord, Jesus Christ.

HISTORY

The College was established by the Catholic Education Commission of WA (CECWA) and officially opened in 1983. A landmark for Catholic Education in WA, as the College was the first non-Orderrun, co-educational Catholic secondary school to be established by CECWA in the Archdiocese of Perth. Located in the southern suburb of Bateman, the College primarily served the surrounding Parish communities.

The College has thrived under the stewardship of Principals Father Robert McCormack, Mr Tony Curtis, Mr David Heath, Mr Vaughan Sadler and currently, Mrs Caroline Payne. Having started with 128 Year 8 students and seven teaching staff, the College currently caters for 1,300 students from Years 7 to 12.



Corpus Christi College focuses on personalised learning, ensuring our students reach their goals through the guidance and support of the College teaching.

In Year 7 students are part of the Middle School and are immersed in a diverse learning program which provides opportunities to find out which subjects appeal to both their strengths and interests. During these formative years, we work on developing a student's skills in areas that challenge them and foster and provide extension in areas they may excel.

In Years 7 and 8 students are provided a broad-based curriculum with exposure to a range of subjects spanning nine Learning Areas.

In Year 9, students are afforded a degree of choice, given the opportunity to select 6 specialist curriculum subjects to study, 3 per semester. At Corpus Christi College, all students study Languages until the end of Year 9.

The Senior School is an exciting place for students as they transition from the Middle School and begin to consider their future beyond secondary school. Students are empowered with greater responsibility for their subject selection and academic direction.

In Year 10 students may have begun forming ideas regarding Year 11 and Year 12 study pathways, and post school careers. To facilitate this, the College offers a curriculum to allow students to develop a broad range of knowledge and skills, while affording students even more choice to more closely mimic the subject selection process for Years 11 and 12. Students who have shown outstanding levels of achievement in Year 9 studies will have the opportunity to accelerate their learning and select certain Year 11 WACE courses.

In Years 11 and 12, students select courses to study which must include English and Religion & Life. Students in Years 11 and 12 select six courses in total in each year.

VOCATIONAL PATHWAYS

Vocational Education and Training (VET) and Transition Services at the College provides guidance and support to students on both General and ATAR pathways. The goal is to enhance students' successful transition from the College to higher education, further training for apprenticeships, or employment.

Students have the option of enrolling in nationally accredited VET courses as part of their Senior School pathway. Delivered by an external Registered Training Organisation, these Certificate II, III and IV courses include:

CAMBODIA IMMERSION

Offered biennially, students travel to Cambodia to participate in a dynamic program of community service and cultural immersion. Activities undertaken include school teaching, house building, Catholic worship, local traditions and sightseeing.

KIMBERLEY

Students have the opportunity to participate in intensive workshops designed to support their curriculum Dance studies.

MUSIC TOUR

Students travel overseas to perform in festivals and at partner schools, as well as engaging in cultural experiences that broaden their understanding of artistic endeavour and local history. The most recent tour took students to New Zealand.

VISUAL ARTS TOUR

Supporting our talented Visual Arts cohort, the tour takes students to renowned institutions such as the Victorian College of the Arts to strengthen their skills in various artforms. Students also tour leading galleries, explore street art, and even add their own mural piece in Melbourne's

SPACE CAMP

Space Camp is a biennial tour to the United States run in conjunction with John XXIII College. Students undertake astronaut training at a NASA facility in Huntsville, Alabama, before visiting cultural sites in Washington, D.C. and sightseeing in Orlando, Florida.

LANGUAGE TOURS

The College offers a choice of three languages as part of the curriculum: Italian. French and Indonesian. To give our students the opportunity to experience a different culture and strengthen their language skills in an intensive format, tours are offered to Italy (Senigallia), Reunion Island and Indonesia (Yogyakarta). Students from our sister schools also visit Perth on a reciprocal exchange maintaining our long-term connections with these sister schools.

Our Learning Centre supports students who require literacy, numeracy and/or organisational support in mainstream classes, so as to fully participate in the senior secondary graduation courses. Our Education Support Centre is for students with disabilities.

The values that underpin these programs are the same for all students at the College, challenging them to use their talents to strive for excellence in all that they do, aiming to identify, reduce or eliminate barriers which limit students' educational participation and achievement.

LEARNING CENTRE

The Learning Centre supports students in the College who require a variety of adjustments to teaching and learning to enable them to access the curriculum in working towards reaching their full learning potential. Meeting the diverse learning needs of students is achieved with the effective support of specialist staff in teaching literacy and numeracy while providing programs, extra support and coordination of information on students with diagnosed learning difficulties and non-diagnosed learning challenges.

EDUCATION SUPPORT CENTRE

Students with disabilities may require particular considerations and special arrangements, higher levels of support, differentiated curriculum and/or specialist assistance in order to achieve their goals. A strong partnership is formed with parents to form the individualised learning plans in the context of the programs offered by the College.

The College has a purpose built Education Support Centre (ESC) catering for students with disabilities from Years 7 to 12, each following an individualised education or transition plan. Students requiring significant teaching and learning adjustments to the mainstream program, and those with a diagnosed disability will undertake classes primarily in the Centre. Where possible, students are grouped according to age and integrated into specialist mainstream subjects and Year appropriate classes.

This strong partnership with the mainstream classes provides an opportunity for students in the Centre to develop wider friendship groups, and to be involved in extracurricular College activities.









FUTURE PROOFING THE COLLEGE INFRASTRUCTURE

The College's ongoing commitment to infrastructure renewal and capital development ensures that students are provided with state-of-the-art facilities and learning areas designed to enhance their educational experience.

Learning at Corpus goes beyond the traditional classroom – our spaces, both indoor and outdoor, reflect this flexibility. The result of the College's Capital Development Plan is a welcoming, ICT-enabled and safe environment where dynamic curriculum delivery takes place every day.

APPLYING TO CORPUS CHRISTI COLLEGE

Corpus Christi College is a coeducational Catholic College catering for approximately 1300 students from Year 7 to Year 12. The College accepts students at all Year levels where places are available, however the main intake is in Year 7.

We welcome parents to register their interest for their child to attend Corpus Christi College by completing an Application for Admission Form.

Due to demand for places at Corpus Christi College, we encourage you to lodge an application well in advance of the entry year and encourage all applicants to take note of the College Student Enrolment Policy.

Should you wish to place an application for enrolment, please complete the Application for Admission Form. Copies of the following documents are to be submitted with the completed form, together with the \$100 non-refundable Application Fee. This Fee is payable per family.

Please provide copies of your child's:

- Full Birth Certificate
- If held, Baptism Certificate (documentation of further sacraments is also welcome)
- If applicable, visa/citizenship papers and passport photo page

Applications for Year 7 entry will generally be considered when your child is in Year 5.

Please note, Applications for Year 8 to Year 12 entry also require submission of:

- A covering letter addressed to the Principal, Mr Frank Italiano, outlining reasons for application
- Two most recent semester-based school reports

- If applicable, most recent NAPLAN results
- Other supporting documentation, such as special interests, awards, certificates of achievements, parish references, etc.

The College Registrar will invite families to an enrolment interview once all supporting documentation has been received (additional information may be requested at the time of interview) and if a place becomes available.

The enrolment interview will be conducted by a member of the College Leadership Team and requires:

- Both parents/guardians (if possible) with the student preferably in uniform
- Completion of the Student Profile (provided by the Registrar prior to the interview)

Once the interview has taken place, if successful you will receive an offer letter, along with a Confirmation of Offer pack to your mail address. To accept your place at the College, you will be asked to sign and return the Confirmation of Offer documentation, together with a non-refundable \$1200 Confirmation of Enrolment deposit. The deposit will be credited against the first school fees account for the year of your child's commencement.
