

Celebrating Literacy and Peracy Week at Peracy Week


Literacy and Numeracy Week at DCS was another roaring success this year!

Technology, Textiles, Agriculture, Metalwork and Woodwork as well as Graphics and Programming in Computing.

In the Graphics unit, students have used 'Sketchup' software to design coffee tables with bevelled tops and shaped legs as well as houses with rooms, furniture and outdoor settings. Students have also extended their skills with their own student directed challenges, producing amazing results such as a scale model of Room 36 at DCS and the Tower of Gibraltar. Next year students will have the opportunity to use an industry-standard program called 'Fusion 360'.

Our first Year 9 Design and Technology (Software) students have created audio podcasts, short videos and an original movie trailer from a wellknown movie. Later this term they will apply a promotional logo onto a product such as a coffee mug, shirt or cap. Year 10 Food Technology created a literary-inspired dessert as well as serving the local community by providing meals for Community Kitchen.

Stage 6 Hospitality commenced the year at the Orana Trade Training Centre and then moved to Bellotti's Restaurant, where they are learning how to serve food and beverages to a high standard. Other subjects studied include Software Design & Development and Primary Industries. Next year Textiles as well as Design & Technology will be offered in Year 11
