Staff

Staff are selected on the basis of merit, qualifications, and skills and especially for their attitude of commitment and care towards students. Staff are expected to be examples upon which children can confidently model themselves.

All teaching staff must be registered with the Victorian Institute of Teaching (VIT). The VIT's purpose is to regulate the teaching profession in Victoria in the public interest by enforcing high ethical and professional standards for teachers.

All staff complete annual mandatory reporting training, and are also trained or updated in first aid, including anaphylaxis and asthma management.

Student Attendance

Student Outcomes

Each year, all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 are required to sit the National Assessment Program in Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) tests. These tests are the only nationwide assessment that all Australian children undertake and establish the proportion of students achieving the national benchmark.

Student Outcomes

Senior secondary outcomes

Our 2022 Year 12 students experienced significant disruption to their senior secondary years, with numerous Covid-19 lockdowns during 2020 and 2021, and enforced quarantine periods for any students testing positive to Covid-19 during the first part of 2022. They showed great resilience and determination to overcome these challenges and we wish them the very best for all of their future endeavours.

In 2022 we had 20 students enrolled in Year 12

- ·Students graduating 20 (100%)
- ·VCAL students 3
- ·Students not seeking an ATAR 3
- ·Students seeking an ATAR 17
- ·Highest ATAR 87.7
- ·Average ATAR 51
- ·14 students applied for courses at various institutions. 3 students got their first preference in the first round offers. 10 students got another preference in the first round offers.
- ·12 students have accepted their offer. 1 student has declined as he will be pursuing an aviation course elsewhere.
- ·4 students did not apply for courses and are undecided about what career they would like to pursue at this stage.
- ·1 student has taken up an apprenticeship.
- ·1 student is in the process of applying for the Defence Force.

Proportion of Year 9 students retained to Year 12

In 2019 we had 29 students in Year 9. In 2022, 20 students graduated which equates to 69%.




Satisfaction Survey 2022

Geelong Baptist College is always looking for ways to improve. We seek input and feedback from our entire community as a way to identify areas for future focus. In 2022, the College conducted surveys with students, parents and staff, in which respondents were asked to evaluate the extent to which they believed effective practice was apparent across the school. Responses were scored on an eleven point scale, ranging from ten being total agreement, down to zero being total disagreement, and converted to an average score out of ten. 
Parent survey





Satisfaction Survey 2022


Student survey


